SCHUBERT'S PIANO MUSIC FOR FOUR HANDS

Here is a selected list of Schubert's piano duets for four hands. The best edition by far is the 3-volume Henle edition. You can usually find this in any good library. Otherwise, the old complete edition – and the Peters Edition on which it is based – will do. The three graded categories are an approximation only.

1. NOT DIFFICULT

- D 814, Four Ländler for piano duet (1824) (These are perhaps the easiest works.)
- D 618, German Dance in G major with Two Trios and Two Ländler in E major for piano duet (1818)
- D 599, Four Polonaises for piano duet (1818, first published as Op. 75)
- D 824, Six Polonaises for piano duet (1826, first published as Op. 61)
- D 618A, Polonaise in Bb major for piano duet (1818, sketch)

(The eleven polonaises vary in difficulty. They are very much worth looking at.)

- **D** 733, <u>Trois Marches Militaires</u> for piano duet (1818?, first published as Op. 51) (This set includes the famous Marche Militaire in D. They are on the fence in difficulty between 'not difficult' and 'somewhat difficult'.)
- D 859, Grande Marche Funèbre in C minor for piano duet (1825, first published as Op. 55)
- D 928, March in G major for piano duet, Kindermarsch (1827)

2. SOMEWHAT DIFFICULT

- D 608, Rondo in D major for piano duet, *Notre amitié est invariable* (1818, 2 versions; 2nd version first published as Op. posth. 138)
- D 819, Six Grandes Marches for piano duet (1818 or 1824, first published as Op. 40)
- D 818, Divertissement à la hongroise in G minor for piano duet (1824, first published as Op. 54) (This is in 3 movements it's possible to do just the first. The later are more difficult.)
- **D 951**, Rondo in A major for piano duet, *Grand Rondeau* (1828, first published as Op. 107) (*The 'primo' part is quite a bit more challenging than the 'secondo' part.*)

3. ADVANCED

- **D** 617, <u>Sonata in Bb major</u> for piano duet (1818, first published as Op. 30) (a work of great charm not easy, but worth the effort)
- D 812, <u>Sonata in C major</u> for piano duet, *Grand Duo* (1824, first published as Op. posth. 140) (*The whole sonata is about 40 minutes long, and has the stature of a great symphony.*)
- D 940, <u>Fantasy in F minor</u> for piano duet (1828, first published as Op. 103) (Musically and technically very challenging)
- **D 947**, Allegro in A minor for piano duet, *Lebensstürme* (1828, first published as Op. posth. 144) (*This is not easy though less complex than the previous two works.*)
- D 968B, Deux Marches caractéristiques in C major for piano duet [formerly D 886] (date unknown, first published as Op. posth. 121) (Charming and comic and virtuosic)
